Back to Binalong – November 17th – 19th 2017



Bush Traditions welcomes you to a weekend Gathering at Binalong on $17^{th} - 19^{th}$ November 2017.

The purpose of the weekend is to:

- Enjoy life
- Get together with the like-minded
- Play music
- Dance
- Learn something new

The GATHERING IN THE BUSH will celebrate the music of Harry Cotter, Val Turton and others, as well as Banjo Paterson, who lived on Illalong Station.

The event will be conducted as a gathering, modelled more on Numeralla than other events we may be familiar with. It will follow the format of a similar weekend held earlier this year when folkies gathered at Sofala to celebrate the music of Joe Yates. The plan is to use existing facilities, e.g. the Binalong Motel (Stephen Street) and the Binalong Hotel (cnr Fitzroy & Wellington) for food, accommodation etc. Participants will be responsible for their own accommodation and meals. There is a large reserve on crown land available for camping. Camping is free of charge and showers will be available courtesy of the local football club. Your organisers will collect \$5 from campers to cover the cost of hot water. Bush Traditions will hire the Hall (Wellington Street, 130M from the Hotel) and will charge a small fee to attend dances in order to recover this cost. Practiced participants will lead music on a come-all-ye basis.

Planning for the weekend is to be kept fairly informal but will include opportunities for a bush dance both Friday and Saturday nights and many informal music sessions. There will also be concertina playing workshops offered throughout the weekend.

Binalong is west of the Hume Hwy, 35 km south of Yass. The town boasts 220 residents and the district another 350. It has a Hotel and a Motel, a community Hall and a large campground. You can find a map here: https://www.google.com.au/maps/@-34.6735029,148.6344627,965m/data=!3m1!1e3

The gathering is the first in what is hoped will be a continuing series of similar events to be run by Bush Traditions in coming years. The aim is to take our collected music back to the communities where it was collected to put the music into its historical context with a contemporary experience. The event is being promoted through the Monaro Folk Society, The Bush Music Club and the Kiama Folk Club.

Love is the Way

When Scottish singer Eddi Reader first heard Declan O'Rourke sing *Galileo*, she told him it was the most romantic song she'd ever heard. She went on to record it and another O'Rourke song, *Love Is the Way*. Canberra folkies got to hear O'Rourke for themselves at the Ainslie Arts Centre (the old North Ainslie Primary; the gig was held in what must have been the old school hall) on Tuesday 3rd October.

And what a treat it was. Exquisite guitar playing; powerful romantic songs like *Galileo, Love Is the Way* and the encore *Golden Bars in the Sun* as well as sensitive historical songs about orphan girls sent to Australia, Irish famine victims (*Poor Joe's Shoes*) and the convict system in early New South Wales (a wonderful version of *Moreton Bay*).

It was Irish singer-songwriter night at the Ainslie Arts Centre with the lively Áine Tyrell from Galway opening the gig. Like O'Rourke she has strong Australian connections. She drove down to Canberra from Mullumbimby. Declan, born in Dublin, lived here for a while as a child and began his singer-songwriter career here when he came back as a young man, taking inspiration from the likes of Paul Kelly and Australian Crawl.

Áine's first song was accompanied by body percussion. Later she gave us jigs on tin whistle and told us she'd played a tin whistle while hula hooping in a circus. Her bracket included two songs about sixteenth century Irish pirate queen, Grace O'Malley: one (in Irish) that children learn at school in Ireland and one she'd written herself: *Pirates Call.* She's got an album called *Queen* of Swords.

Both singers commented on Ireland's endorsement of marriage equality in a referendum in 2015 and hoped a "Yes" vote would do the same here. Two weeks later, Declan O'Rourke was back in Canberra to sing three songs for Irish President Michael D Higgins at the Irish Embassy: *Poor Joe's Shoes, Moreton Bay* and his poignant tribute to the Dublin tenement children who died during the 1916 Rising, *Children of '16*.

Introducing Maleny

Yes, Maleny has its own festival, usually the last weekend in August, but this year held on the first weekend in September, starting Friday night and running until late Sunday afternoon. It is one of the smaller festivals, with three performance venues, a workshop tent, a session tent, a very active kids' festival, and street performances. Size doesn't mean a lack of quality though, it is well worth escaping Canberra's still cold weather and starting your festival season early with a visit north. Nights are cool, but the days warm up quickly. You could even follow up Maleny with Neurum Creek Festival the following weekend, and still get home in time for the first of the southern festivals.

Music and poetry performers and performances - just some highlights.

This was the fourth time we have attended this festival since moving to Queensland. The first couple were fairly traditional "folky" festivals, though with lots of good music, with more performers of the style of Cloudstreet and Rebecca Wright and Donald Mackay. The last two festivals have had more performers new to us, and a definite move towards folk/blues styles.

This year's headliners, however, were Martin Pearson and Bruce Watson, who have styles all of their own of course, and who are well known to Canberrans.

3 Miles from Texas (Texas Queensland, not USA!) one of our surprise "gems" for this year, kept our feet tapping with "alternative folk with a soaking of blues", but also some great harmonies and a variety of instruments, four guitars, accordion, fiddle, and a small drum. This was our first band of the festival, on a cool Friday evening, and, along with a very nice mulled wine and good gas patio heaters, certainly helped settle us nicely into festival mood.

Other highlights for us were a band called Tin Stars. Guitars, fiddle, accordion, billed as "reminiscent of the burgeoning sounds of the sixties", they were certainly melodic with great voice ranges. We did think a fair bit of their work, especially the original numbers, were more blues style, but that in no way lessened their virtuosity, and they certainly enthralled their audiences. They were the only band we made a real effort to see twice, although we caught a bit of some others more than once.Montgomery Church was one of those. Ciele and James from Cooma were a delightful duo to listen to, with dobro, guitar and soaring vocals. A duo well worth watching out for locally if you haven't already heard them.

We managed to make it to all of both Poet's Breakfasts, on Saturday and Sunday mornings. These are led by the very funny and very talented Ian Mackay. A wonderful addition this year, and also a festival performer in his own right, was Irish Joe Lynch. He is funny, poignant, a skilled storyteller, and has a great singing voice too. All delivered in a strong Irish accent, but with a clear voice so his audience had no problems understanding him.

Also known to many MFS folk, will be Evan Mathieson who did a wonderful workshop of Sea Shanties. In Evan's effective manner, each song was preceded by a fascinating historical anecdote that introduced the setting for the song.

We ended our festival on Sunday afternoon listening to Tawny, the only Celtic band we heard all weekend. With strong Irish instrumentals, they certainly had the audience out on the floor dancing, although only about six of the dancers were dancing irish dances, and just for a couple of sets and some jigs.

Dancing and street performers.

This festival does not have a focus on formal dancing, although this year Barleyshakes played and called for a bush dance in Maleny Community Hall on Friday night. It was free for festival goers, a small fee for anyone else. Otherwise, three sets of street performers danced at various times throughout the weekend. Raggedy Band Morris presented all the fun and intricate performance of traditional Morris; the very versatile and agile hula hoop girls danced at several venues, and did a street workshop; and a group named Cherry Ripes (in their head-to-toe cherry orientated outfits) did a Zumba workshop. Carnavalia O Gypsy Circus thrilled watchers after dark with fire eating, tumbling, juggling and other acrobatic antics. No animals involved!

Food and drink.

From about midday, and all through the evening, there are three bars operating, one next to each main performance venue. They serve canned and bottled beers, cans of Guinness, several different wines and spirits and the best mulled wine that I have had since Andrew Pattison days at the National. The bar areas are separated from the actual performance venues by low barriers, and monitored by security staff so that alcohol can't be taken outside the specified area, but you can comfortably watch the performances from each bar area.

There are good coffee stalls, and a wide variety of herbal tea choices.

There is the usual fairly broad and eclectic choice of food, although we did find evening hot food a slight problem, but mostly due to my dairy dietary issues, as we didn't want the same vegetarian curry every night. We managed though as we had given ourselves the option of doing some self-catering in our caravan.

Conclusion

Like every festival, it all ended too soon, and feels too long to next year. The volunteers did a fantastic job, as volunteers do, but are always looking for more folk to add to their teams. Just a four hour shift over the weekend gets you a festival ticket, including camping. The festival is held at Maleny Showground, which has some powered campsites, although you have to book early for those, plenty of unpowered camping space, and enough hot showers and toilets that you never have to queue for very long.

So check the website, put it in your diary, and we will see you there next year.
