From the President's Soapbox

Last Saturday, MFS participated at the annual CAP Expo at the Old Bus Depot with an information stand displaying musical instruments, which led to many discussions with passers-by. Those who play instruments were happy to hear that we have open sessions that they are welcome to attend, while others expressed interest in our dance workshops. Many thanks to the members who came and spent some time on the stand chatting with these folks. We also had a time slot on the dance stage: 3 musicians were enough to carry the accompaniment but over 16 dancers, including some newcomers to our Monday bush dance workshops, turned up which was fantastic. It was run as a workshop demonstration, called by Mark Simmons, and some of those watching did join in and had a good time of it. Thanks to all of you who came and enjoyed making it a success. The group onstage before us (the belly dancers) played to packed stands so we are considering a future change in bush dance attire to spangled bikinis and feathers for the ladies and loincloths for the gents, which will undoubtedly swell our audiences....

Mark then headed off to the Woolshed to call for the Kids bush dance which began at 2.30pm with the TiN MuGs, led by Daryl, providing the music. Attendance at Kids dances had dropped off to a very poor level last year, however this event was a great success with about 80 children and parents turning up and having a really good time: this was greatly due to the work Roy Harvey had put in on promotion, proving that the participation is there as long we can successfully get the word out in advance. Great job all round! The Shearers Ball at the Woolshed that night also drew a fair number, with music by Stringfiddle led by Bob McInnes and calling by Don Richmond. Only two weeks now to the NFF! MFS will be hosting a blackboard "Evening Muse" between 6pm and 9pm on Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings at the Central Park Stage, with Eileen as MC. Bush Dance Workshops are on holiday. After 3 April the next Monday workshop will be on 1 May. There are five Mondays in May, so get out your dance shoes and be at All Saints on Monday evenings at 8.00 pm for a fun evening of bush dancing to live music.

Not a dancer, but can play an instrument - then come along too and join the band - no charge for musicians.

Dancers - it's just \$6 for MFS members for two hours of dancing (with a brief break for a cuppa and light supper). Contributions to supper welcome but not essential.

All dances taught by our expert callers, Daryl, Peter and Mark, and called, so no experience needed and no partner necessary (but do bring them if you have one).

The annual Shearers' Ball on Saturday 25th March 2017

The 2017 annual Shearers' Ball was held at the historic Yarralumla Woolshed in Canberra where dancers enjoyed a special evening of traditional bush dancing.

The popular band Stringfiddle, led by Bob McInnes, played very well and Don Richmond did a great job at teaching and calling the dances.

The event kicked off at 8pm and continued with music and dancing until close to midnight!

The music of Stringfiddle led by Bob McInnes contributed immensely to making it a memorable night!

Don Richmond's dance repertoire is undoubtedly very wide and interesting and at the Shearers' Ball he confirmed his reputation for being one of Australia's most accomplished callers. The dance program included a large variety of fun dances from the Australian bush dance tradition.

In the very early days of settlement in Australia, dances from England, Ireland and Scotland were very popular. From the ballrooms of the cities and towns, these dances would quickly spread to the rural areas. Over the years, dances from other parts of Europe, including France and Germany were also introduced.

Known as "bush dances", these events would often be held in woolsheds and shearing sheds which provided shelter, a space to dance and hardwood floors. In fact, the lanolin from the sheep's wool made it possible for dancers to 'glide' on the floor. The bush dances were a great way to meet the locals and, in some cases, the only way of meeting a possible partner! The Yarralumla Woolshed brings its own history of shearing and rural life and its atmosphere contributed to making the Shearers' Ball a special event.

Originally built in 1904 by Frederick Campbell of Yarralumla, the Federal Government resumed construction of this historic property in 1913. Since the 1970s, the building has become an important Canberra community social venue, particularly as a focus for bush dances and folk music. Various organisations, including the Monaro Folk Society, continue to use it as a venue for dances.

The 2017 Shearers' Ball was a great way to have fun and experience dances from decades long gone.

Dancing at the Cobargo Folk Festival from Paul Carr

Leslie and I were asked to help Fran Robinson with the dance program at this year's Cobargo Folk Festival and I thought I would share our experiences with MFS members in this article, and start a conversation with Canberra dancers about what worked well and what else we can include in future years to attract more of you to come along and enjoy yourselves.

This year the festival, under the stewardship of executive director Zena Armstrong, committed fresh resources to the dance program including two new venues, quality PA equipment, stage managers and sound crew at all dance events.

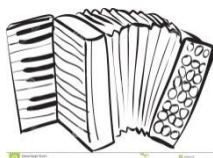
The evening dances were held in the recently renovated School of Arts Hall, a pleasant ten minute walk back into the village from the main festival site at the showgrounds. The hall has a good floor and large raised stage area for the band and caller. This year the Friday night dances consisted of two bush bands. Mike Martin did a good job calling a selection of accessible dances in a friendly welcoming way with the Kameruka Bush Orchestra and Friends supplying the music. Later in the evening we had a fine selection of engaging dances called by our own Clare Stoneman with music supplied by Folklines. On Saturday night No Such Thing supplied an excellent selection of tunes with the 'big band sound' that such a large collection of fine musicians can supply. Sally Leslie kept the proceedings under control with the caller's mic and treated us to a pleasant selection of dances. The highlight of the weekend for me followed with an Irish Set Dance Céilí dancing to the wonderful music of the Bunch of Keys Céilí Band. Calling by Paul Carr and Chris Briton.

The combined displays and workshops were held on site at the Brolga stage. Each group were given an hour and fifteen minutes and encouraged to mix up displays and teaching within that time slot however

they wished. The venue was excellent with a spacious wooden floor under cover in a central location that attracted plenty of foot traffic, who came along both to watch and join in. A great mix of workshops included Yoga, Wake Up to Dance, Barefoot Salsa and Samba, Renaissance, Irish Set, Colonial, Cajun, Mexican, Family Dance, Morris, Blues, and African. Some of the workshops attracted big crowds with up to sixty to seventy dancers filling the stage. The MFS was well represented with teaching and calling by Clare Stoneman, Lance Green and Gabrielle Mackey, Paul and Leslie Carr, Chris Briton, and Rachel Murphy.

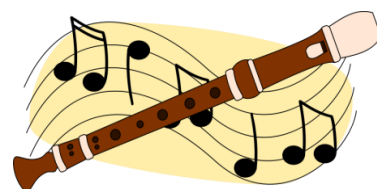
